Performing Arts Department — The Christmas Show



Mr Ledwards: Year 7

It does seem a while since the first day on September 5th; nonetheless it has been a wonderful first term for Year 7. I am proud to say they have settled in extremely well, and the transition from primary to high school has been a smooth one. We have a great group of bright and talented students within the year group and, despite them only being a term into their tenure with us at Ruskin, there has been plenty of evidence of this. The students have adapted well to the demands that comes with moving into secondary school and have shown a positive attitude towards both classwork and homework.

Students have accumulated over 31,000 positive points between them and a special mention to 7SAL who are responsible for nearly 7000 of these points. Attendance has also been good, although the second half term has been significantly lower than the first half term. Attendance for Year 7 is currently at 94.9%; a huge well done to 7FID who sit on 96.2% as form. It is essential attendance is maintained at this high level as we progress through the academic year.

We have had nearly 30 students who have achieved their 250 positive points award and will receive their bronze badge to show this achievement. Well done to those students! I am sure lots more will achieve this in the Spring Term.

A huge thank you to all the parents and carers that attended the Year 7 form tutor evening which took place on Wednesday 18th October. Over 70% of our students' parents managed to attend that event.

We had Year 7 support weeks running in between 16th October and 3rd November. The focus was a 'Star of the Lesson' challenge. I am pleased to say 43 students achieved 3 or more 'Star of the Lesson' awards that week and were entered into our prize draw for All4One vouchers.



Sefton Palm House

Year 10 Art and Photography visited The Palm House, Sefton Park and The Tate Art Gallery at Liverpool Docks.



When Sefton Park opened its gates in 1872, it was missing a centrepiece. A generous donation by local benefactor, Henry Yates Thompson, led the Parks Committee to abandon plans for a band pavilion and set their sights on a spectacular Palm House.

In 1896, Henry Yates Thompson's donation of £10,000 was a gift to the people of Liverpool. It enabled the Parks Committee to appoint leading glasshouse suppliers of the day, Mackenzie and Moncur Ltd of Edinburgh and Glasgow, to design and build a magnificent temperate winter garden, which opened to the public in 1896.

The great glass domes provided the ideal conditions for plants from South East Asia, Australasia, the Americas, Africa, Europe and the Mediterranean to thrive. The Palm House quickly became one of Liverpool's top visitor attractions. History - Palm House Sefton Park








Science—Brain Anatomy

Following our lecture last week on the evolution of the brain, 40+ students had the chance to explore the intricate anatomy of the brain, eye and skull.



Attendance at Ruskin

As you will be aware, attendance is always a key focus at Ruskin. Attendance at school is essential in order for students to make the progress they are capable of and succeed during their time at secondary school.

We give students the challenge of having 95% attendance or above and anything lower than this can have a big impact on students learning, as you can see from the chart below:

We do know that on occasions, absence is unavoidable. On these occasions, we do ask that you contact the school every day that your child is absent. If we do not get information on this or a valid reason is not given, your child's absence will be marked as unauthorised. One day is worth two absences (am and pm registration) and ten unauthorised absences could result in you being fined by the local authority. Holiday fines are sent where ten sessions (five school days) are missed.



Reporting a Student Absence

Our preferred method for reporting absence from school is via the Class Charts app. Your child should have the details for you to log in to the app/website in their planner. If you do not have this, they will be given out again at the start of the new academic year, or please contact the school. You can now also track your child's attendance every day on Class Charts.









Behaviour at Ruskin Community High School

In May, we trialled a new behaviour system to support and improve in-lesson behaviour. This included two main changes to our systems already in place. In lessons, teachers are now using our four Core Values of **High Aspirations, Respect, Confidence and Community** when discussing both positive behaviour and when behaviour needs to be addressed.

Positive Points on Class Charts

You will now notice that all of our positive points are related to our four Core Values. Check Class Charts to see which of the Core Values your child has been awarded.



Star of the Lesson

At the end of every lesson, teachers now award a 'Star of the Lesson' to one student in the class. This is worth five points on Class Charts. Since we started the system, 546 students out of 580 have been awarded 'Star of the Lesson'. Check Class Charts to see if you child has been awarded 'Star of the Lesson'.



Ruskin Core Values and Chance-Choice-Consequence

We have introduced the Chance-Choice-Consequence system to make it really clear to students about how they should behave in lessons.

Chance: The student is not following the Core Values and need to change this. The teacher will inform the student that their behaviour is not following the Core Values and why, and inform them that this needs to be changed.

Choice: The student is still not following the Core Values and it is disrupting their learning/ the learning of others. The teacher will explain to the student that they have a choice to either improve their behaviour/attitude relating to the Core Values or be given a consequence. They will make it clear that they have now been given a choice and a negative 'Choice' point is awarded on Class Charts.



Consequence: The student has been unable to follow the Core Values and therefore will have a consequence for this.

The student will receive either:

An Immediate Sanction: This could be a **detention set** for that day, removal to Support Timetable, removal to the Remove Room or removal to a designated member of staff.

A Delayed Sanction: Detention set for another day, a phone call home or meeting with Parent/Carer.

The introduction of this new system and the 'Star of the Lesson' has been positive and we have seen an improvement in the general attitude to lessons and learning. We look forward to embedding this further in the new academic year.

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
Rewards Day

Some Gentle Reminders:

UNIFORM

Please remember:

- NO sculptured haircuts, including patterns, are allowed and hair length must be at least a Grade 2 or above.
