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Year 9 Sheffield Video Game Museum



Our Year 9 Computing students recently enjoyed an exciting and interactive visit to the Sheffield Video Game Museum, where they explored the fascinating history and evolution of gaming technology.

The day began with a hands-on workshop focused on the history of video game controllers. Students learned how controllers have developed over the years—from the early days of joysticks to the complex systems used in modern consoles. Inspired by this, students then had the chance to design and build their own controllers using tin foil, crocodile clips, and simple circuit-making techniques. Once their creations were complete, the challenge was on—students competed in a game of Space Invaders using the controllers they had made themselves.

Following the workshop, students had time to explore the museum, which features a huge variety of consoles and games spanning several decades. From retro arcade machines to modern gaming systems, there was something for everyone to enjoy. The museum also included educational and adaptive games, ensuring all students could get involved.

The students' behaviour throughout the day was exemplary, and they represented the school with pride. It was a brilliant day filled with learning, creativity, and of course, plenty of fun. A big thank you to the students for making the experience so memorable.

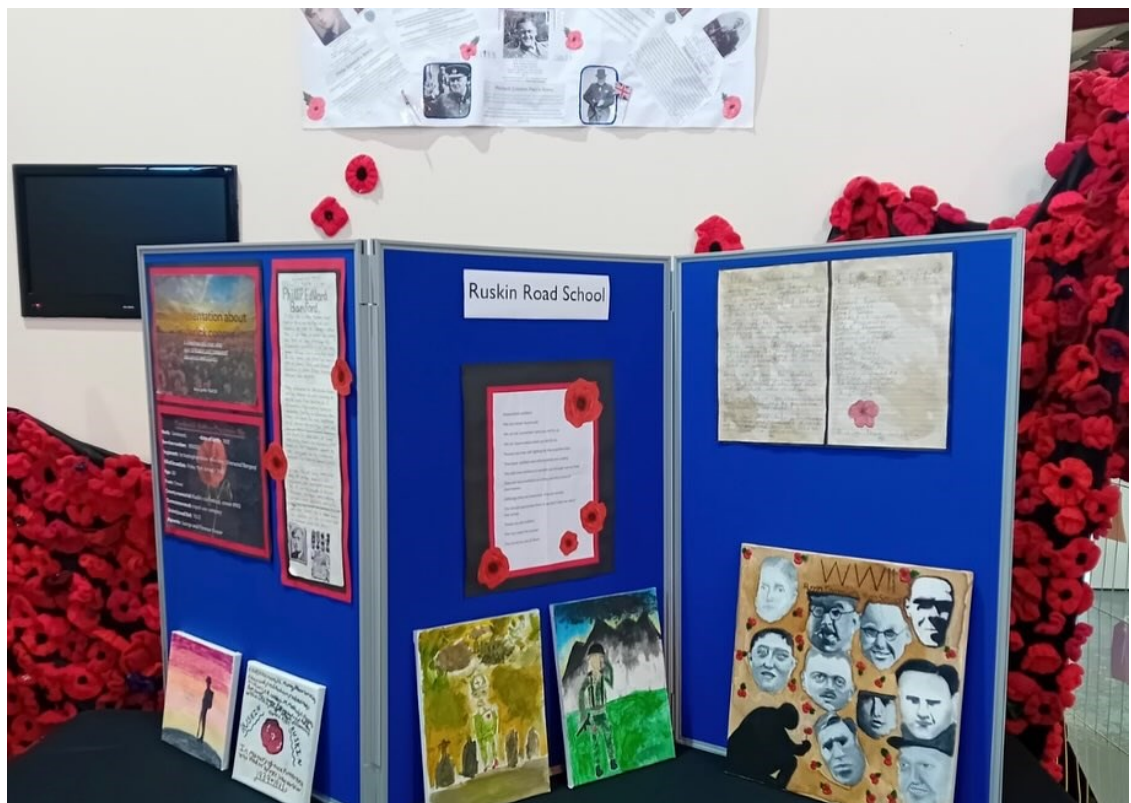

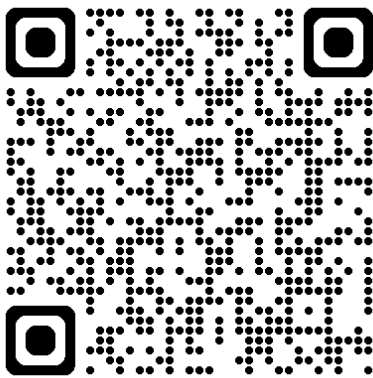

School Gateway– New Payment System

School Gateway – Payment system for trips, dinner money and school shop

School Gateway enables you to make online payments via the School Gateway smartphone app or website. You will also be able to view school meal balances and top them up at any time.

You are notified by text or email when new items such as school trips are available for payment on School Gateway. You will also be able to give online consent, where required, for your child to take part in activities.

School Gateway makes it much easier for parents/carers to pay at any time.

Activating your School Gateway Account is quick and easy to do:

1. All you need is your email address and mobile number that the school holds on record for you.
2. Download the app: If you have a smartphone, please download School Gateway from your app store (Android and iPhone). The app shows the same information as the website. Instructions can be found below.


Mathematics Department

Students in Year 7 and Year 8 took part in a 60-minute, multiple choice mathematical challenge from the UKMT. Using high levels of reasoning and keeping precision and clarity of thought, students were challenged on 25 mathematical multiple-choice questions under an hour of strict exam conditions.

Well done to all the 54 students from Year 7 & Year 8 who took part in the junior UKMT challenge. A special mention to the 3 top achieving students who successfully secured a silver certificate (Mylo N, Kai B and Leon S) and a further 18 students who attained a bronze certificate.

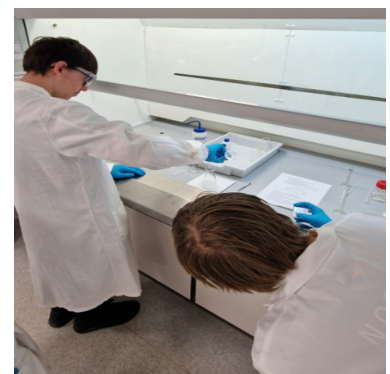
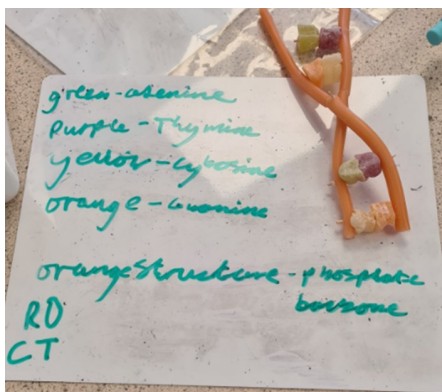
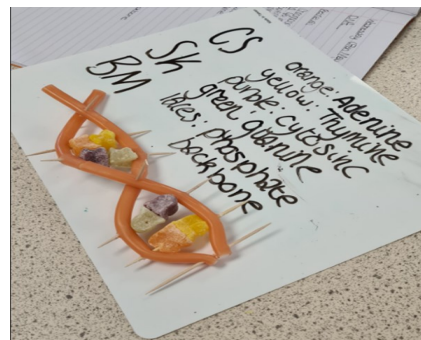
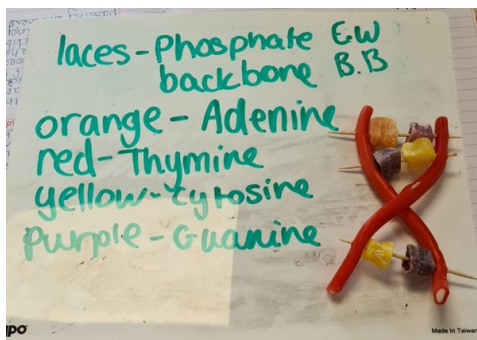
Art & Technology

**Learning Together,
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We have had lots of exciting activities happening in Science so far during the Summer term. Here is a taste of what's been happening in lessons:

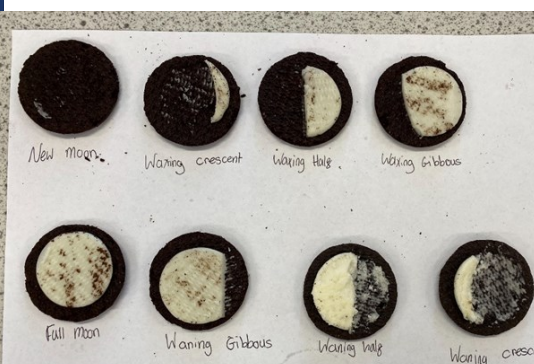
- ⇒ Year 7 have been learning all about the structure of the Earth and space. Students have investigated the solar system and the far extending universe. Students have also investigated properties of sound and light, learning about mechanical and electromagnetic waves.
- ⇒ Year 8 have been building on Year 7 topic of Variation and Reproduction. They have now started to learn about Evolution, Natural Selection and DNA. In addition, Year 8 have also expanded their breadth of knowledge on waves by consolidating on their Year 7 learning, looking at longitudinal and transverse waves.
- ⇒ Year 9 students have been learning about electricity investigating series circuits, parallel circuits, resistance and electricity in the home. Students have also learned about important life processes such as photosynthesis and respiration.
- ⇒ Year 10 students have been learning around the areas of the particle model of matter and atomic structure and radioactivity in Physics. They have had opportunities to enhance their practical skills, looking at investigations and density and specific latent heat, whilst learning about theoretical concepts such as nuclear radiation and half-life's.
- ⇒ Year 11 students have been working hard in lessons on making final improvements to their science knowledge and understanding to improve their outcomes.





We have had lots of other exciting activities happening in science so far throughout the Summer term. This includes:

- ⇒ STEM Club – Students have made their own fossil imprints, researched and made models of the solar system, designed model aeroplanes and tested their ability to fly and finally made their own perfumes using a range of chemical techniques. Thank you to Miss Silcock and Mr Mountford for their hard work running STEM club.
- ⇒ Keele University Higher Horizons trip – Students from year 10 attended a visit to Keele University and took part in many different activities to raise their own awareness and aspirations for potential careers in scientific fields. Students performed experiments on factors affecting rates of chemical reactions at the Keele Central Sciences Laboratory. They also took part in seminar sessions on the eye and spent time at the observatory making observations on the Sun. Thank you to Mr Gray for organising with Higher Horizons.
- ⇒ We also have more trips planned for the latter half of the Summer term. Year 10 Triple Physics students will also be taking part in a field trip to the National Space Centre located in Leicester. This will help to supplement their learning for their Physics GCSE with great focus on the Space topic. They will explore areas such as the expanding universe, red-shift and the life cycle of stars.





Wings of Wonder: A Butterfly Release with Our Students

Over the past month, students in The HUB nurtured caterpillars through their metamorphosis, observing each stage with curiosity and care. The release of the butterflies became a moment of connection, celebration, and symbolism as we said goodbye to our Year 11s. We all cheered as we watched the delicate wings flutter into the sky.

The Summer term has been an exceptionally busy and productive time for our Year 10 students. Throughout the term, they have participated in a variety of trips across different curriculum areas, with a strong focus on exploring careers and future education pathways.

This term also marked their first real experience of a formal examination period. From the 18th to the 25th June, students sat mock exams designed to mirror the pressures they will face next summer—often with two exams scheduled on the same day. This experience was crucial in helping students understand the demands of exam season and the importance of thorough revision beforehand.

These exams will also play a key role in shaping effective intervention strategies, setting, and exam tiering as the students move into Year 11.

Following the exams, there has been an increased focus on careers education. On Thursday 3rd July, Year 10 students attended the Secondary College event at Cheshire College South & West. This annual gathering brings together Year 10 students from local schools and offers a valuable opportunity to explore a wide range of courses they might consider after leaving Ruskin.

The variety was impressive—from traditional A-level academic courses to more vocational BTEC options. As staff, it was inspiring to see students engaging in activities they might never have had the chance to try before, from hairdressing to motor vehicle mechanics.



Earlier in June, we launched the Prefect and Head Prefect application process. The response was outstanding—39 students applied, including 15 vying for the Head Prefect roles. All applicants presented themselves with great confidence and maturity, and the speeches delivered by the head prefect candidates were truly impressive. Standing in front of peers and staff to deliver such speeches is no easy task, so a huge congratulations to all involved.

I'm also delighted to report that Year 10 was strongly represented in the Ruskin end-of-year show. The performances were incredible and reflected the hard work and dedication the students put into the production. They truly made the year group proud.

Looking ahead to the next academic year, our Year 10 students will become the oldest in the school. It is vital they set a positive example for the younger years. Year 11 will undoubtedly be their most challenging year yet, but also potentially the most rewarding. Maintaining an attendance rate above 96% and fully engaging with intervention opportunities—both during and outside school hours—will be essential.

I have no doubt that, come August 2026, we'll be celebrating many happy faces achieving the GCSE results they deserve.

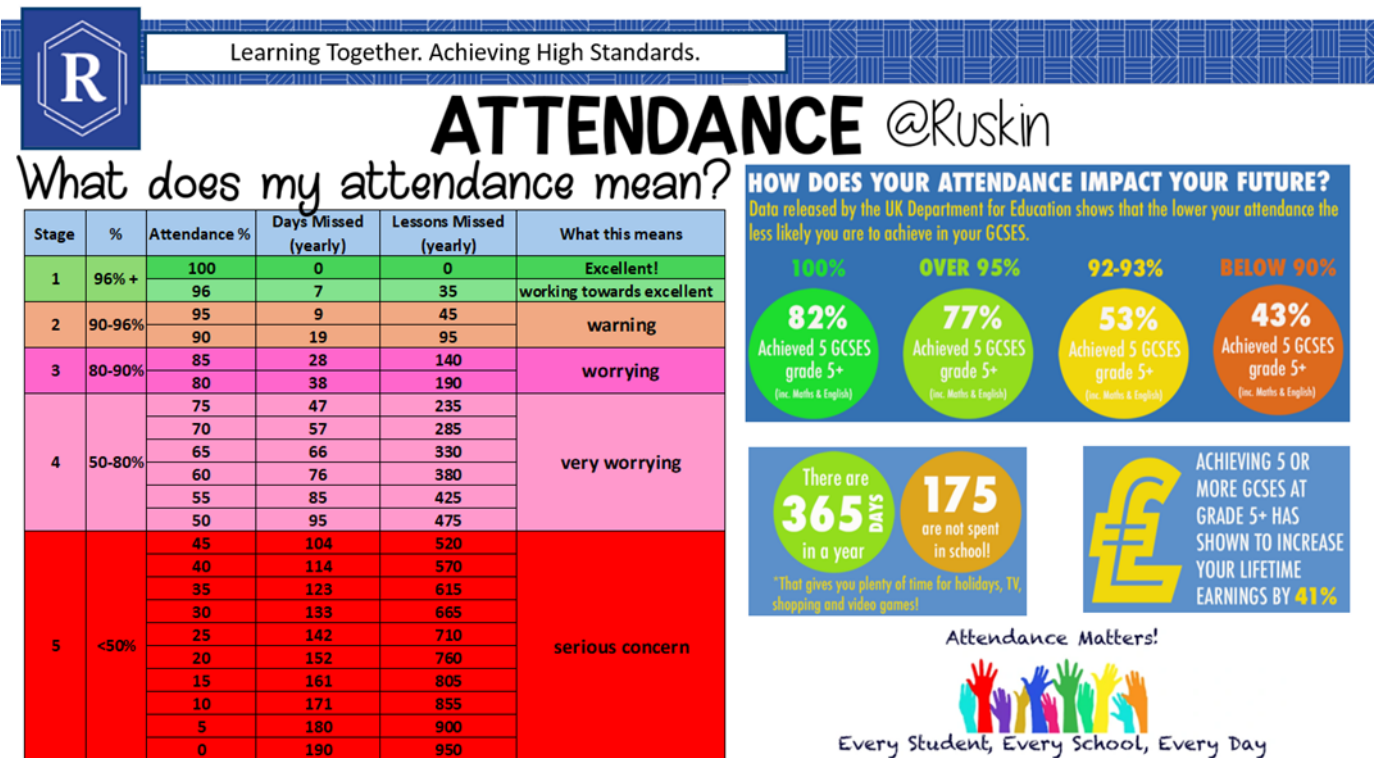

Attendance at Ruskin

As you will be aware, attendance is always a key focus at Ruskin. Attendance at school is essential in order for students to make the progress they are capable of and succeed during their time at secondary school.

Students have an attendance target of 96% or higher. Anything lower than this can have a big impact on students learning, as you can see from the information below:



Penalties for Unauthorised Absences

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PENALTY NOTICE FINES FOR SCHOOL ATTENDANCE ARE CHANGING !

With the introduction of the new National Framework for Penalty Notices, the following changes will come into force on 19 August 2024.

Penalty Notices will be issued for

Term time leave: Penalty Notice fines will be issued for term time leave of 5 or more consecutive days.

10 Sessions of Unauthorised absence in a rolling 10 week period: A Penalty Notices may be considered when there have been 10 sessions of unauthorised absences in a 10 week period.

However, we retain the discretion to issue a Penalty Notice before the threshold is met. For example, where parents are deliberately avoiding the national threshold by taking several term time holidays below the above thresholds.

Per Parent/Per Child

Penalty Notice fines will continue to be issued per parent per child. For example: 3 siblings absent for term time leave, would result in each parent receiving 3 separate fines.

First Offence

The first time a Penalty Notice is issued for term time leave or irregular school attendance the fine will be charged at:

£160 per parent, per child if paid within 28 days of the issue, reducing to £80 per parent, per child if paid within 21 days.

(Unpaid penalty notices may result in a parental prosecution)

Second Offence

Where it is deemed appropriate to issue a second penalty notice to the same parent for the same pupil within 3 years of the first penalty notice, for either term time leave or irregular attendance the second penalty notice will be charged at:

£160 if paid within 28 days. (Unpaid penalty notices may result in a parental prosecution)

Third Offence

On the third time that an offence is committed within 3 years of the first penalty notice for either a term time leave or irregular attendance a penalty notice will not be issued. The case may proceed to Parental Prosecution under the Single Justice Procedure. If found guilty of the offence of 'Failure to send a child to school' the Magistrates can impose a fine up to £1000 or legal proceedings under Section 444 (1a) can include a fine of up to £2500.

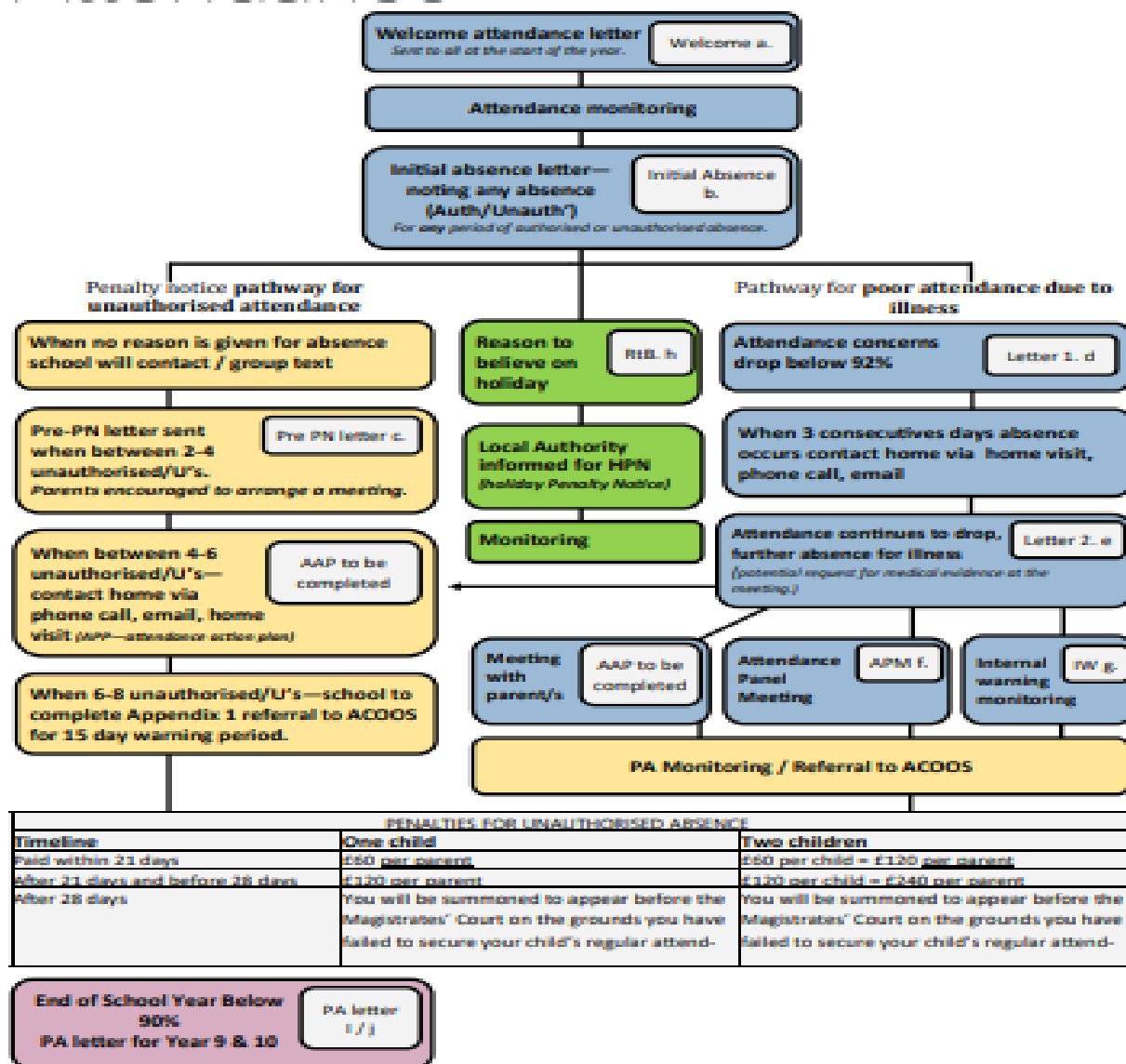


Reporting a Student Absence

Attendance

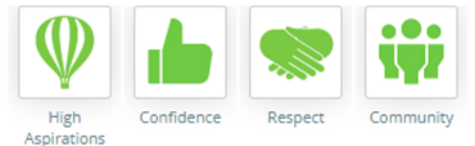


Behaviour at Ruskin Community High School

In May, we trialled a new behaviour system to support and improve in-lesson behaviour. This included two main changes to our systems already in place. In lessons, teachers are now using our four Core Values of **High Aspirations, Respect, Confidence and Community** when discussing both positive behaviour and when behaviour needs to be addressed.

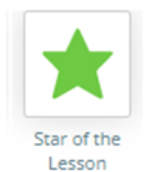
Positive Points on Class Charts

You will now notice that all of our positive points are related to our four Core Values. Check Class Charts to see which of the Core Values your child has been awarded.



Star of the Lesson

At the end of every lesson, teachers now award a 'Star of the Lesson' to one student in the class. This is worth five points on Class Charts. Since we started the system, 546 students out of 580 have been awarded 'Star of the Lesson'. Check Class Charts to see if your child has been awarded 'Star of the Lesson'.

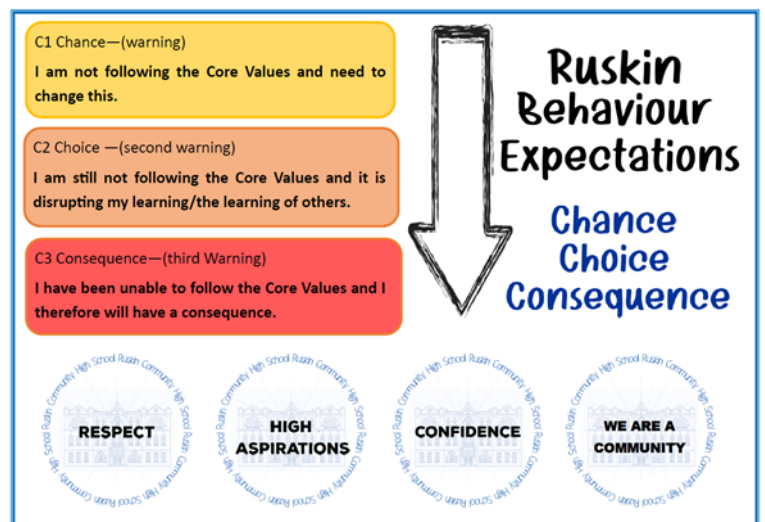


Ruskin Core Values and Chance-Choice-Consequence

We have introduced the Chance-Choice-Consequence system to make it really clear to students about how they should behave in lessons.

Chance: The student is not following the Core Values and need to change this. The teacher will inform the student that their behaviour is not following the Core Values and why, and inform them that this needs to be changed.

Choice: The student is still not following the Core Values and it is disrupting their learning/ the learning of others. The teacher will explain to the student that they have a choice to either improve their behaviour/attitude relating to the Core Values or be given a consequence. They will make it clear that they have now been given a choice and a negative 'Choice' point is awarded on Class Charts.



Consequence: The student has been unable to follow the Core Values and therefore will have a consequence for this.

The student will receive either:

An Immediate Sanction: This could be a **detention set** for that day, removal to Support Timetable, removal to the Remove Room or removal to a designated member of staff.

A Delayed Sanction: Detention set for another day, a phone call home or meeting with Parent/Carer.

The introduction of this new system and the 'Star of the Lesson' has been positive and we have seen an improvement in the general attitude to lessons and learning. We look forward to embedding this further in the new academic year.

MOBILE PHONES

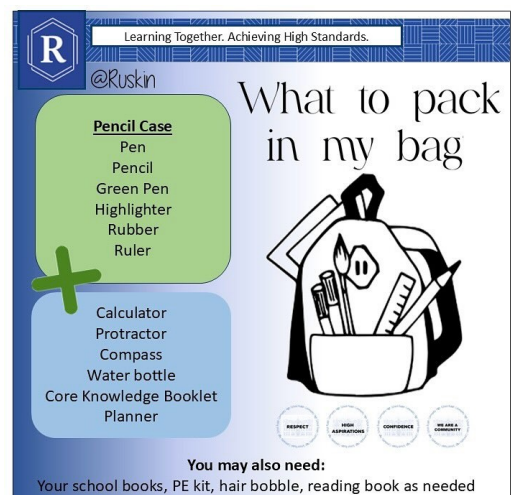
Mobile phones are to be switched off at all times.
