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As we near the end of our spring term in Year 9, I would like to reflect on and celebrate the many successes and achievements of my year group. It has been a very important term for the students as they have chosen their options for four of their GCSE subjects that they will study in years 10 and 11. Assemblies have been delivered from all the possible GCSE subjects. These assemblies explained the themes and topics of each subject, how the subject would be assessed (by examination only/a combination of coursework and examination/coursework only) and what type of career the subject could benefit. Following this, students had the opportunity to take part in taster sessions where they could sample the type of lessons they would have at GCSE level, and ask further questions in a small group. The final part of the process was the Year 9 Options Evening where parents and students could discuss subjects and student's suitability for those subjects with the teachers who were able to give advice to the students about their choices. Following this, the students have made their choices and are now waiting patiently as Miss Szymura completes the demanding task of trying to fit all students into option groups.

Many students continue to take part in many of the clubs which are offered at lunch times and after school: Art Club, Computing Club, MFL Film Club and many sporting clubs including, badminton, football, netball, basketball and dodgeball. These clubs are essential for developing individuals skills and interests which will be invaluable when students come to apply for college places, apprenticeships and employment opportunities in the coming years.

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Year 11 have continued to work incredibly hard this term and I remain so proud of how they have been embracing the challenges of their final year at Ruskin. It has been a busy term as we approach the summer exams. There has been a lot happening academically with many extra-curricular opportunities too. There have been several trips and visits this term involving year 11, including a GCSE Business trip to the Trafford centre, which I know the students found to be a valuable experience.

Of course, the focus this term has been preparation for the summer exams. Students have been fortunate to have workshops delivered by staff on revision techniques, along with the visit from Mr Beezy in January who provided them with lots of motivational messages and strategies to succeed. Lesson 6 attendance and lunchtime intervention sessions have been well attended, and I encourage all students to make the most of this extra support available. Students should, at the very least be attending the extra sessions offered in English and Maths. There are also lots of sessions being put on by staff over Easter to support students with extra tuition in a variety of subjects and I would strongly recommend they take advantage of these if they can. The summer exams are just around the corner now, so students need to take every opportunity to ensure they are prepared and ready for these.

This term has seen most students apply for one or more Further Education Providers and try to plan their next steps once they have left us in the summer. All students have received a careers meeting and we know most student are in a position where they can focus on their exams having applied for various courses.

The next half term will be a challenging one for all the students in the year group in the run up to their exams. All we can ask of them is to do their very best and we, as a school, will be immensely proud of them. Whilst GCSE exam pressure is normal, we do encourage any students that are feeling this pressure is too great, to speak to a member of staff so we can look at additional support measures.

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We have had lots of exciting activities happening in Science this term. Starting with what has been happening in lessons:

- Year 7 have been building on their KS2 knowledge of genes & energy by studying variation & human reproduction, energy stores & transfers, fuels as energy stores, energy in the home & the cost.
- Year 8 have been building on Y7 work on energy & Earth by studying machines, work done, thermal energy, carbon cycle & the changing Earth.
- Year 9 students have further learnt about the enzymes involved in digestion including food testing. Students have also defined reactions as endothermic or exothermic with the introduction of practical techniques to measure this.
- Year 10 students have used their prior learning on organisms and cells to study how organisms are affected by, give rise to and respond to communicable diseases. Students have developed their understanding of respiration and photosynthesis as chemical processes fundamental to life as well as studying chemical reactions in non-biology scenarios.
- Year 11 students are now embarking on a comprehensive review of the entire curriculum, encompassing Paper 1 & Paper 2, ensuring a thorough grasp of the subject matter in preparation for their exams to start in May.

We have had lots of other exciting activities happening in Science including:

Science Week – ‘Change and Adapt’. Students all took part in a class practical to build an eco-home and prizes were given for the best designs. We also had a special session in Science Club looking at how gummy bears change in different liquids. There was an eco- scavenger hunt and poster competition also happening, which is still to be judged.

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

There was also a trip out to Cheshire South and West College with Year 10 students who undertook an Anatomy workshop with the live interactive anatomy tables and a chemistry workshop. This was an excellent session ran by the college.

Mr Gray has also arranged a Lego robotic workshop through higher horizons where students design a robot with Lego and then activate it to move and dance. This was a marvellous opportunity for our Year 7 and 8 students.

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English Department Term Update

We're pleased to share highlights from our students' achievements in English this term.

Year 11

Our Year 11 students have shown exceptional dedication to their GCSE English Language studies and Literature exam preparation. Their commitment to Period 6 sessions has been remarkable. A term highlight was motivational speaker Mr. Beezy, who delivered an inspiring talk on resilience and study habits, followed by specialised workshops for students and parents on exam preparation and support strategies.

Year 10

Year 10 students have been studying Shakespeare's 'Macbeth,' exploring themes of ambition, power, and morality. We're organising a special theatre trip featuring a production that incorporates revision techniques, with a narrator highlighting key quotations and themes. Students have also made excellent progress with their Power and Conflict Poetry anthology.

Twenty Year 10 students visited Oxford University's Somerville College, enjoying a tour, lunch in the college dining hall, and a session exploring life's big questions, followed by a visit to the Ashmolean Museum.

Year 9

Year 9 students have engaged with two compelling units: Gothic literature and Shakespeare's Villains. Their Gothic exploration has inspired atmospheric creative writing, while their comparison of Shakespearean antagonists like Iago, Lady Macbeth, and Richard III has produced impressively mature analytical essays.

Year 8

Year 8 students have studied 'Oliver Twist,' using Dickens' portrayal of Victorian London to develop their transactional writing through diary entries, newsletters about workhouse conditions, and persuasive pieces on social reform. Their work on 'Romeo and Juliet' has included creative dramatisations and thoughtful character analysis.

Year 7

Our Year 7 students have begun their secondary English journey with Romantic Poetry, studying Wordsworth, Blake, and Keats and creating their own nature-inspired poems. 'A Midsummer Night's Dream' has provided an engaging introduction to Shakespeare, with students enjoying the magical elements and comedic aspects through drama activities, creative writing, and analytical discussions.

As you will be aware, attendance is always a key focus at Ruskin. Attendance at school is essential in order for students to make the progress they are capable of and succeed during their time at secondary school.

We give students the challenge of having 95% attendance or above and anything lower than this can have a big impact on students learning, as you can see from the chart below:

We do know that on occasions, absence is unavoidable. On these occasions, we do ask that you contact the school every day that your child is absent. If we do not get information on this or a valid reason is not given, your child's absence will be marked as unauthorised. One day is worth two absences (am and pm registration) and ten unauthorised absences could result in you being fined by the local authority. Holiday fines are sent where ten sessions (five school days) are missed.

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




Attendance at Ruskin

Reporting a Student Absence

Our preferred method for reporting absence from school is via the Class Charts app. Your child should have the details for you to log in to the app/website in their planner. If you do not have this, they will be given out again at the start of the new academic year, or please contact the school. You can now also track your child's attendance every day on Class Charts.



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Behaviour at Ruskin Community High School

Our behaviour system to support and improve in-lesson behaviour. This included two main changes to our systems already in place. In lessons, teachers are now using our four Core Values of **High Aspirations, Respect, Confidence and Community** when discussing both positive behaviour and when behaviour needs to be addressed.

Positive Points on Class Charts

You will now notice that all of our positive points are related to our four Core Values. Check Class Charts to see which of the Core Values your child has been awarded.



Star of the Lesson

At the end of every lesson, teachers now award a 'Star of the Lesson' to one student in the class. This is worth five points on Class Charts. Since we started the system, 546 students out of 580 have been awarded 'Star of the Lesson'. Check Class Charts to see if your child has been awarded 'Star of the Lesson'.




Ruskin Core Values and Chance-Choice-Consequence

We have introduced the Chance-Choice-Consequence system to make it really clear to students about how they should behave in lessons.

Chance: The student is not following the Core Values and need to change this. The teacher will inform the student that their behaviour is not following the Core Values and why, and inform them that this needs to be changed.

Choice: The student is still not following the Core Values and it is disrupting their learning/ the learning of others. The teacher will explain to the student that they have a choice to either improve their behaviour/attitude relating to the Core Values or be given a consequence. They will make it clear that they have now been given a choice and a negative 'Choice' point is awarded on Class Charts.



Consequence: The student has been unable to follow the Core Values and therefore will have a consequence for this.

The student will receive either:

An Immediate Sanction: This could be a **detention set** for that day, removal to Support Timetable, removal to the Remove Room or removal to a designated member of staff.

A Delayed Sanction: Detention set for another day, a phone call home or meeting with Parent/Carer.

The introduction of this new system and the 'Star of the Lesson' has been positive and we have seen an improvement in the general attitude to lessons and learning. We look forward to embedding this further in the new academic year.

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Some Gentle Reminders:

UNIFORM

- **NO** sculptured haircuts, including patterns, are allowed and hair length must be at least a Grade 2 or above.
- Hair should be a natural colour.

- No fake tan.

MOBILE PHONES

Mobile phones are to be switched off at all times.

Phones taken on a Friday will be returned to the student at the end of the school day. Parents will be informed.

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
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High Aspirations

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
